# Meet Your New Committee



## President: Laurie Nicolle

Laurie purchased his first Arabian horse at the age of 15 years. It was a purebred Arabian named Hamish which he purchased from Franklin Arabian Stud. He was keen on rodeoing and wanted Hamish for a calf roping horse at which he excelled.

Late 1975 at a Ralvon Sale he purchased from Star of Arabia Stud, the Collette the mare Godiva with a colt foal at foot (Star Of Arabia Sir Ghazal) and in foal again to Al Karim Sir Halima. His next purchase was the yearling filly Shazilla from Thornton Park Stud. She was top price of the sale where she was purchased and then a few years later came Wataba

Things progressed from there with foals born and the stud started. Shazilla went on to be Res. Australian Champion mare in 1982, Wataba was Australian Top Ten in 1985 and Shazilla's first foal, Laurjil Razeem went Australian Top Ten Stallion the same year. In 1986 Razeem went Australian Top Ten Stallion under saddle.

Laurie became a member of the Tasmanian Division of the Arabian Horse Society Ltd (Now Tas ARAB's) in 1975 and has served on the committee as a member or President most years until 2002 when he was honoured with Life Membership of the Club

In 1999 he was elected to the Arabian Horse Society Board and served there for 10 years after which he was presented with Life Membership, much to his surprise, at the dinner at the 2009 Arabian Championships in Victoria.

1987 saw the advent of endurance when the Tom Quilty first came to Tasmania and Laurie got the endurance bug and started competing. He has gained 2 Tom Quilty buckles on LaurIn 1990 he was elected to the Tasmanian Equine Endurance Assn committee and immediately elected President and nominated to be the Tasmanian delegate to the Australian Endurance Riders Assn. In 1999 he was elected AERA President where he held office for 3 years. He was also an FEI Technical Delegate from which he has now retired.

2002 found Laurie all committed out and he resigned from them all except the AHSA Ltd

Also in 1990 Laurjil and Shaylyn Arabian stud combined to become Lauralyn Arabians.



## Vice President: Steph Loan

Hi I am Steph Loan and I am vice president. My only vice is horses, especially Arabians. I am 64 years old and breed and show a few Arabs. My most successful horse has been my Anglo mare "Underwood Elegance" who had a great season last year.

My buckskin pony deserves a mention too as she has won as much if not more than Ellie. Underwood Cookies n Cream or Poppy has a fan club as well. She will be ridden by Alex Spillane in the coming season and we have Sydney and the Grand Nationals targeted for 2011.



## Treasurer: Sherry Fenton

I have been previously involved with Tas ARABs for many years and due to a sincere passion for the club I find myself once again on the committee carrying out the duties of Treasurer.

I have always had a true love for horses since my early childhood which apparently was a phase I was supposed to grow out of but did not.

I acquired my first horse a part bred Arabian a grandson of Flash of Gold when I was 21 years old from there the vision grew to one day breed Arabians.

Valley Springs Arabians was founded in 1992 and although always only being a small stud breeding for quality not quantity my passion is now what is apparently known as a terminal case of "Arabianitis" for which there is no cure other than to strive on and satisfy my desire to breed beautiful functional people loving Arabians.

The stud is located at Blackwood Creek a 40 minute drive South of Launceston.



## **Secretary: Yvonne Downes**

Ray and I arrived in Tasmania in early April 2006 to begin our new life of "semi retirement". We were supposed to be slowing down and enjoying life. We had sold and given away some of our precious horses and were supposed to bring 6 (according to Ray), but 10 came with us. We had a big auction and sold most of our horse gear and household stuff, which we had accumulated over more than 35 years.

We had been to Tassie 4 times a year for the previous few years and had bought our 50 acres in 2004 - just as prices were rising. It had nothing on it except 2 water troughs and a couple of rough internal fences. Luckily the boundary fences were all in fair condition. The two mares and foals went in one paddock and all of the others together in the other.

We had to go back to Sydney almost immediately as I was judging at Sydney Royal. For the first few weeks we lived in a flat in Riana, about 10 kms away.

Then we were robbed.

All our stuff was in two shipping containers and our old truck. We lost a new TV, a new DVD player, some electrical stuff that would be easy to sell, and other household things. Also taken was Ray's 4WD farm bike, a couple of chainsaws, heaps of tools, and even our dog food !!!! About \$15,000 worth all up, and the insurance company wouldn't touch us. Luckily, they didn't get in to the truck and take any of the horse gear. A lot of other stuff was thrown all over the place and trampled in to the mud.

So, as soon as we could get the electricity connected, we hired a little old caravan and moved in. For 12 months we lived partly in the caravan and partly in the shipping container while we built the house. It was okay.

Once we moved in, I started pressuring Ray for a couple of yards so that we could break in our young horses - who were 6 yrs old at that point !!!

We are gradually setting things up and now have an almost finished hay shed (with hay in it), some cross country training jumps, lots more water troughs, and lots more internal fences. We are progressing.

There are currently 13 horses here, 10 of which are ours. We have 2 fillies on agistment for a friend and a Part Arabian gelding we have just broken in. There are 2 mares in foal to Moondarra Limelight - Ennovyar Patience (Ralvon Job x Ennovyar Pure Gold) and Ennovyar Velvet Sky (Sky Hussar x Ennovyar Pure Velvet) ; 2 mares have filly foals - Ennovyar Deep Velvet (Ralvon Mark x Ennovyar Pure Velvet) has a liver chestnut filly by Lauralyn Bay Magic, who will be called Ennovyar Deep Affection . The Arabian Warmblood Ennovyar Amie (Ennovyar Patriarch x Kilwarran Valkyrie) has a light chestnut filly by Barabas (imp), and who will be called Ennovyar Magdalene. We also have a young mare Ennovyar Soft As Velvet (Ralvon Mark x Ennovyar Pure Velvet), a yearling filly Ennovyar Faith (Lauralyn Bay Magic x Ennovyar Patience), a gelding Ennovyar Golden Phoenix ( Sky Hussar x Ennovyar Pure Gold), and a young Warmblood mare Ennovyar Picasso's Dream (Argentille Picasso x Killwarran Valkyrie).

Our horses compete regularly in open dressage (with Dressage Tas), one day events and horse trials, training and endurance rides, as well as shows etc. They have to be versatile, and I like them to do a bit of jumping. But, we have toned our competition down a lot. We enjoy meeting people involved with horses - especially Arabians.

On the mainland we travelled a fair bit, usually with a truck load of horses, to compete at some of the big shows and have a few Australian Championships, Reserves and Top Tens, as well as big sashes from shows like the National, NSW State Ch'ships, Midstate Ch'ships, Arabian Saddle Horse Ch'ships, Ruth Dalton Memorial, etc.

I am also an EA Dressage judge, EA Show Horse judge, Jumping Equitation judge, AHSA National Panel judge, Panel judge for several other breeds, and an EA / NCAS Coach, and Pony Club coach. I have judged at most major shows in Australia, as well as overseas.

We are both on the committee of our local church ; are both on the horse committee of the Burnie show, and I have been the secretary of the for the past 2 years ; I have been President of the Gunns Plains Community Centre for 3 years ; and I very stupidly put up my hand as secretary of Tas ARABs this year.

We certainly are enjoying life in our little piece of heaven in Tassie, but I don't know that we have "slowed down".





### **Show Co-ordinator: Leonie Kirkhope**

I have been showing horses for the past 30 years with great success including at Royal Show level and HOY, winning three times at Intermediate level with my own and other's horses as well as winning Intermediate Rider of the Year twice and runner up twice.

My home bred horses under the "Nigella" stud name in which I established in 1992, have taken out many Supreme of shows at All Breeds and Agricultural shows with in Tasmania.

I am currently leasing the stallion 'Dutton Lea Select' from Les Judd in Victoria, and he has proven he is very good show horse as well as a sire, winning Supremes at many of our bigger shows.

I have been on many horse committees' over the years including the steering committee for Hack Council in Tasmania, Tas Arab's, Tas Buckskins, and R.P.S.B Tas Branch.

I have been a member of Tas Arab's for more years than I can remember and have been on the committee for approx 6 years as a committee member, Secretary & President over that time.

I love to promote the Arabian horses as a whole, not just the purebreds, which most people associate with Tas Arabs and it is with pride that I let everyone know that mine are all derivatives, and one 'Nigella Wanna Lucy' has 50% Arabian blood.

I feel it is up to us as owners to promote the Arabian as a whole not as part or pure so get out there and show off yours with pride like I do and show what a lovely versatile breed they are.



### **Publicity Officer: Sarah Wells**

I am 25 years old and have been involved with horses pretty much my entire life. Along with my mother and step father we have been running PERFORMANCE PARK ARABIANS for the past 20 odd years. Away from the horses I am an Enrolled Nurse working in aged care it is a very demanding job, but I honestly enjoy working with the elderly. They have some wonderful stories to tell.

I relocated to Tasmania from Queensland in early 2005, and couldn't think of a better place to live. The friends that I have made since moving to Tasmania especially through my involvement with horses are wonderful. I currently have a small number of horses here in Tasmania competing, in everything from Hacking, Endurance, Dressage, Showjumping and ODE'S. Our horses are currently enjoying wonderful success within endurance with PP LADY KHARISMA just placing 3rr Middle weight and 1st teams in her first marathon the FAR AWAY 320klm FEI marathon.

I currently have a number of younger horses in Training and so far are showing a lot of potential. I am currently looking forward to another busy but enjoyable year of showing here in Tasmania as well as on the mainland. With the first of the mainland shows being the Qld Arabian Challenge Championships in May.

I also got the endurance bug in 1987 and after strapping for 5 years started riding myself. In 1992 I was Tas Equine Endurance Riders Assn. Rider of the Year. Have gained 5 Tom Quilty 160km buckles in various states. Since then I have competed in endurance and attended the Tas ARAB's show most years.

# Tas Arabs Trail Ride held at Blackwood Creek

Saturday May 1st was cool, grey and moist, but the weather cleared in time for the Trail Ride at Valley Springs Arabians at Blackwood Creek. Bronc and Sherry Fenton have a lovely spot with a beautiful mountain backdrop.

The 13 riders set off around 10.30 am with the lead horse setting a brisk walking pace. Some horses were a bit stressed and fidgety at the start, but most settled down once we were out along the gravel road. We crossed a concrete bridge and then took a left turn down a rocky laneway and through some paddocks with scrubby bush. This gradually gave way to dense forest as we climbed. We left the main track and turned right into a bush track. This was beautiful deep forest, with lots of large man ferns and the track became more rugged, and wove its way through the bush. We had four creek crossings, and some short, steep climbs. We came to a fence with a gate that probably requires a two day training course to learn how to open, and at this point our lead rider farewelled us as she had another appointment.

Sherry now took over as lead rider and we were now on a dirt lane/track which wound its way upwards. We seemed to be climbing up and up, and eventually the track levelled out and started to go down. As we looked over the treetops, we could see a beautiful panorama in front of us, stretching as far as the coast. It was a steady downhill track and as we came out of the thick bush we were on another dirt track. To the left we had the lovely view of the valley and back to the right was the majestic Western Tiers, dark and shrouded in mist.

The track worked its way down through some lovely farmland and joined the Hop Valley Road. Here we turned right and followed the gravel road through the quiet farms and over two bridges and back through the welcoming gates of Valley Springs Arabians.

The horses were tended to, and then the riders, grooms/strappers/attendants/family members etc all gathered under the covered veranda and relaxed with beautifully cooked sausage sandwiches complete with a variety of sauces and coleslaw. Hot tea and coffee was on hand, while Bronc appeared with unlimited trays of the most delicious jelly slice - which he claimed to have made himself. 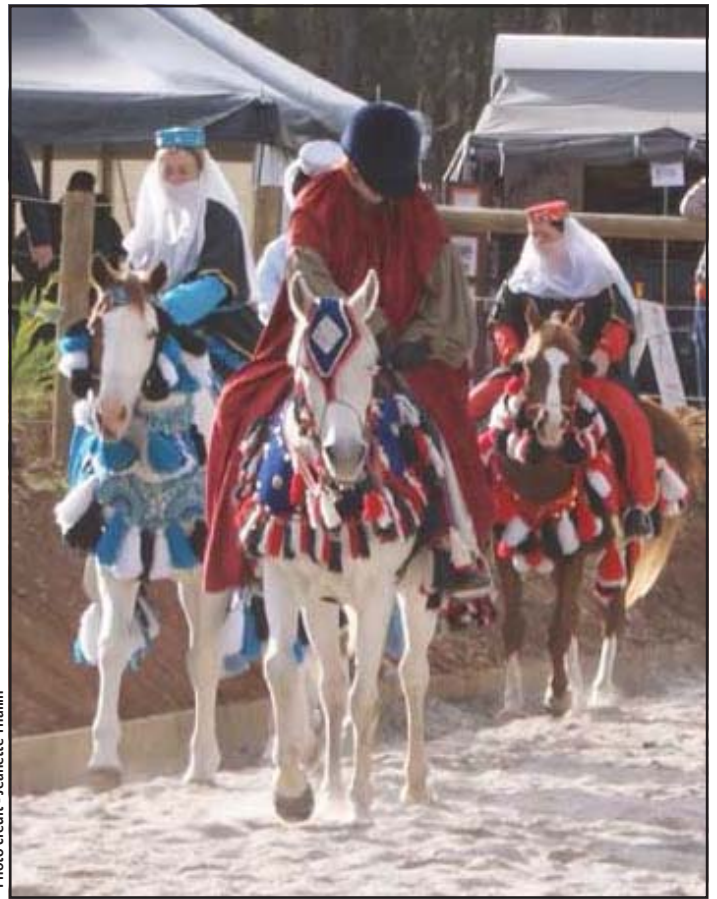
